Annual "No Laughing Matter" Comedy Night Gala Raises \$600K Using Humor to Inspire Hope for Kids with Brain Tumors

The fourth annual "No Laughing Matter" comedy night was held on October 14th and raised approximately \$600,000 to support pediatric brain tumor research. The fundraising event was hosted at the New York Athletic Club by the Children's Brain Tumor Project Foundation. An all-star comedy line-up of talented comedians donated their time and talent to the laugh-out-loud fundraiser, 100% of the proceeds from which directly benefits the Children's Brain Tumor Project (CBTP) at Weill Cornell Medicine.

Liz Laugh Love Award Recipient Veronica Marsano

In addition to side-splitting comedy, the evening included the third annual Liz Laugh Love award presentation. This year, the Children's Brain Tumor Project was proud to honor Veronica Marsano and her family for funding the launch of a comprehensive precision medicine program for children with brain tumors at Weill Cornell Medicine. Their generous gift in memory of Veronica's son, Patrick, has enabled the lab to define individualized cancer therapies for children with rare and inoperable pediatric brain tumors.

The award is named after Elizabeth (Liz) Minter, who is remembered for her abundant love and familiar laughter after she passed away from the same disease as Patrick in 2012. Before she died, Elizabeth created a unique fundraising initiative that became the cornerstone for the creation of the Weill Cornell Medicine Children's Brain Tumor Project.

Good Humor Award Recipient Anthony Greco

The recipient of the Good Humor award was Anthony Greco, a previous patient of Dr. Mark Souweidane. After several years post-treatment, Anthony is now a stand-up performer in New York City who often finds clever ways to incorporate his experience battling a brain tumor into his material. The audience agreed that not only was his performance at No Laughing Matter hilarious, it was extremely meaningful.


The Children's Brain Tumor Project Foundation, an Official Charity Partner of the TCS New York City Marathon, Raises More Than \$60,000 Thanks to our Dedicated Runners!

For the first time as a new nonprofit, the Children's Brain Tumor Project Foundation (CBTPF) was named an official charity team in the TCS New York City Marathon. On Sunday, November 6, our dedicated team of athletes proudly ran through all five-boroughs of New York City to honor children and families who have been impacted by a pediatric brain tumor diagnosis. The CBTPF awarded marathon entries to sixteen athletes who raised a combined total of \$60,000! The 2022 TCS New York City Marathon marked the race's return to full capacity with 50,000 runners for the first time since 2019, and the CBTPF was among 500 official charity partners selected to provide runners the opportunity to run in the world's most popular marathon.

CBTP "Do Something" Spotlight Eager Student Shares Experience at the CBTP

I knew that my experience at Weill Cornell Medicine was going to be extraordinary—but I never imagined just how extraordinary it would be. And that's because of the people.

Going into this experience, quite frankly, I was terrified. Being only 14-years-old, I was well aware of the large age gap between myself and the other young adults pursuing similar opportunities at the hospital. On my first day, I sat down next to another shadow and she asked me what grade I was going into. I told her I was going into my freshman year, to which she responded "where"? It was only after she told me she was a sophomore at Vanderbilt did I understand that she assumed I was in college. I guess behind the mask she couldn't tell I was still in braces. I was scared that because of this, my interest wouldn't be taken seriously. More than anything though, I was scared that I would miss out in some way. So, I promised myself to never say no to a learning experience and to always listen as hard as I could; even if it meant that by the end of those five short days I would be totally exhausted.

I didn't really think that's how this would happen, though. I knew that these incredible doctors who I hadn't even met yet were conducting research to cure all pediatric brain tumors! Who was I to get in the way? But I didn't know them, and now I do.

These people curing pediatric brain tumors care in a way that is hard to understand until you get to know them. They care about their patients, in a one-on-one manner that I marveled at during every clinic checkup, every early post-surgery rounds, and every newcomer who was there for a second opinion. The team cares so much and they entrusted me to care, too, by inviting me to those early morning zooms and rounds, explaining CT scans, and giving me literature to read so that I could better understand the discussions taking place during patient check-ups.

I knew I wanted to be a doctor, but I didn't know the what's or how's of it. After a week with them, I can tell you. I want to be the kind who engages their understudies with every scan, like Dr Souweidane. The kind with a wall of child handprints in my office, like Dr Greenfield. The kind of person who carries herself with the grace that only comes with the patience and compassion of Cindy Campbell. The kind of doctor who cares.

Thank you to everyone who made this experience at the Children's Brain Tumor Project so memorable and life-changing for me. I can't wait to come back!

Love 4 Lucas Continues to Support the CBTP

Recent Donation or \$50,000 will Enable the Hiring of a New Post-Doc for the Lab

On December 12, the Love4Lucas Foundation presented a generous donation of \$50,000 to the Children's Brain Tumor Project to support the funding of a new post-doctoral scientist in the lab. The new post-doc will be focused on studying developmental biology with a large percentage of research committed to understanding how cell differentiation may lead to the development of diffuse intrinsic pontine gliomas (DIPG) in children.

Ultimately, such findings can lead to discoveries in how to interrupt and alter the differentiation process when cells develop into tumor cells instead of the appropriate form/function at cell maturity.

Love4Lucas is a nonprofit organization in Pound Ridge, NY, that was founded in memory of Lucas Harashima. In 2017, Lucas was diagnosed with DIPG at just five-years-old. He passed away from the universally terminal brain tumor just 18 months later. The organization's mission is to fund research towards a cure for DIPG and to support families battling DIPG.

DIPG is a devastating childhood disease in desperate need of a cure. The organization's website reads, "The journey ahead is unknown, but with love, energy, and hope we can all be a part of the fight." Our team is proud to join Love4Lucas in this fight fueled by love and hope.
